Caltrans Bike Month Push Signals Active Transportation Work

Caltrans and the California State Transportation Agency marked May is Bike Month with a leadership ride and event outside the agency's Sacramento headquarters on May 7, drawing more than 100 riders alongside Transportation Secretary Toks Omishakin and local officials.

Beyond the celebration, agency leaders reiterated a commitment to expanding active transportation infrastructure statewide. Caltrans advisors said the department is adding bike lanes, crossings, and stronger connections to transit as part of its Complete Streets efforts.

For contractors, the emphasis points to continued demand for bikeway construction, roadway restriping, pedestrian crossing improvements, and multimodal

transit connection projects on state and local routes. Firms with experience in Complete Streets and active transportation work may see bidding opportunities tied to these priorities.

The event was co-sponsored by the Office of Traffic Safety, the city of West Sacramento, the 50 Corridor TMA, and Sacramento Area Bicycle Advocates, with the 7-mile route running from midtown Sacramento to West Sacramento and back.

Caltrans Memorial Spotlights Work Zone Safety For Road Crews

Caltrans held its 36th Annual Workers Memorial in West Sacramento, honoring the 195 department workers killed in the line of duty since 1921. The ceremony at River Walk Park brought together families, state officials and employees to reinforce the goal of zero highway fatalities and serious injuries by 2050.

This year's event was dedicated to Construction Inspector Mahdi Khorram, who was killed in a work zone incident in Contra Costa County on September 18, 2025. His death underscores the ongoing risks faced by crews and inspectors working alongside live traffic.

State Transportation Secretary Toks Omishakin and Caltrans Director Dina El-Tawansy emphasized renewed action to protect front-line transportation workers and to build a stronger culture of safety across the department's operations.

For contractors and subcontractors performing state highway work, the continued focus on work zone safety signals ongoing scrutiny of traffic control plans, worker protection measures and safety compliance on Caltrans projects statewide.

Caltrans Opens \$35M Planning Grant Round For Sustainable Transportation

Caltrans has opened its annual Sustainable Transportation Planning Grant program, making roughly \$35 million available statewide for planning work aimed at cutting greenhouse gas emissions, expanding multimodal travel options, and helping underserved communities better withstand natural disasters and extreme weather. The application deadline is 5 p.m. on Friday, October 9, 2026, with awards scheduled to be announced in spring 2027.

For contractors, this is upstream money. Planning grants do not pour concrete or move dirt on their own, but they are the seedbed for the capital projects that follow. Corridor studies, active-transportation plans, transit access assessments, and resilience planning funded in this cycle are how local agencies define the roadway, bikeway, transit, and drainage improvements they will eventually bid out for construction. Firms that track where these dollars land get an early read on the public-works pipeline two, three, and four years down the road.

The program draws on a mix of funding sources, including Senate Bill 1, the Road Repair and Accountability Act of 2017, the State Highway Account, the Federal Transit Administration, and the Federal Highway Administration. That blend matters to the construction community because SB 1 has been a durable, dedicated stream for California road and transit work since it took effect, and its continued flow into planning signals sustained investment in the state's transportation network for years to come.

Eligible applicants are transit agencies, local governments, regional and metropolitan transportation planning organizations, and Native American tribal governments. In practical terms, that means cities, counties, transit districts, councils

of governments, and tribes across the state will be preparing applications this fall for planning studies that shape future construction programs. Contractors with relationships in those jurisdictions should pay attention to which entities apply and what corridors they target.

The stated goals of the program point directly at the kinds of construction work that tend to follow. Reducing greenhouse gas emissions and enhancing multimodal transportation typically translate into bike lanes, sidewalks, crosswalks, curb ramps, bus stops and shelters, transit signal priority, complete-streets reconfigurations, and roadway restriping. Resilience planning for disasters and extreme weather points toward drainage upgrades, culvert and storm-system improvements, slope stabilization, and hardening of roads and transit facilities against flooding and heat.

That scope spans a wide range of trades. Grading and earthwork crews, paving contractors, concrete flatwork specialists for sidewalks and curb ramps, striping and signage firms, electrical contractors for signals and lighting, and drainage and utility subcontractors all stand to benefit as planning studies mature into shovel-ready projects. Structures work may enter the picture where planning identifies the need for pedestrian bridges, retaining walls, or grade separations along key corridors.

The phasing here is important for firms to understand. This is the front end of a long cycle. Applications are due this October, awards come in spring 2027, and the actual planning studies run after that. Only once a study is complete and an agency secures capital funding does a project move to design and then to construction bidding. Contractors who want to be positioned for the resulting work should treat this

grant round as intelligence gathering rather than an immediate bidding opportunity.

Still, the early awareness has real value. A firm that knows a city is studying a particular arterial for a complete-streets overhaul, or that a transit agency is planning improved bus access in a disadvantaged community, can begin building the relationships, past-performance record, and local knowledge that make the difference when the construction contract finally goes out to bid. Public agencies often favor contractors who understand a corridor and its community context, and that understanding starts at the planning stage.

Caltrans is supporting applicants throughout the process. The department will host application workshops beginning the week of August 24 and will offer technical assistance right up to the October 9 deadline. Resources and application materials are posted on the Sustainable Transportation Planning Grant program page. Contractors with government-relations staff or those who partner regularly with local agencies may find it worthwhile to encourage clients in their service areas to apply, since a successful application today can seed a buildable project tomorrow.

The emphasis on underserved communities is another signal worth reading. State transportation funding continues to pri-

oritize equity, meaning planning dollars and the construction projects that follow are increasingly directed to communities that have historically seen less infrastructure investment. Firms with experience delivering work in urban infill settings, rural areas, and tribal lands may find growing demand as these plans convert into capital programs.

Because the funding is statewide and roughly \$35 million is awarded annually, the geographic spread of eventual projects will be broad. From large metropolitan planning organizations in the state's major regions to small rural counties and tribal governments, the coming award cycle will touch communities across California. Contractors operating in any given region should monitor which local applicants succeed in their area to anticipate the specific corridors and facility types that will generate future work.

The bottom line for California's construction industry is that this grant round is an early indicator, not a bid opportunity. There is no immediate contract to chase, but there is a map being drawn of where the state and its local partners intend to invest in cleaner, safer, more resilient transportation. Firms that study that map now, cultivate the right agency relationships, and stay ready for the design and construction phases to come will be best placed to capture the public work that flows from this year's planning grants.

FlatironDragados-Sukut JV Wins \$1.8B Anderson Dam Job

A joint venture of FlatironDragados and Sukut has secured a \$1.8 billion contract to upgrade the Anderson Dam near San Jose, one of the largest public-works packages in Santa Clara County in recent years.

The dam is currently operating at reduced capacity because of seismic concerns, and the work is aimed at bringing the structure up to modern earthquake safety standards.

For contractors and subcontractors in the Bay Area, a project of this scale points to substantial subcontracting and supply opportunities tied to heavy civil, earthwork and water-infrastructure trades.

The award underscores continued investment in California dam safety and reservoir reliability, work that is expected to generate demand for specialized labor and equipment throughout the project's duration.

Legislative Endgame Could Shape Billions in Construction Work

California contractors watching the Capitol have reason to pay close attention as state lawmakers head into the final stretch of the legislative session. According to CalMatters, several unresolved deals on the agenda before adjournment carry direct implications for the construction and public-works industry, touching on climate money, wildfire response, and the ambitious California Forever development. How these fights land will help determine where public and private dollars flow in the coming construction cycles.

Among the biggest items in play is climate funding, a broad category that in past sessions has translated into bond mea-

sures, grant programs, and direct appropriations underwriting everything from clean-energy facilities and grid upgrades to water infrastructure and coastal resilience projects. For firms that bid public work, the size and structure of any climate spending package matters enormously, because it dictates whether money reaches shovel-ready projects quickly or gets tied up in study and permitting phases that push construction starts years out.

Wildfire is the second major thread lawmakers are expected to take up before campaigning begins in earnest. Wildfire policy in California has repeatedly generated construction

demand, whether through hardening of the electrical grid, fuel-reduction and vegetation-management contracts, defensible-space work, or the rebuilding that follows destructive fire seasons. Any legislation that funds prevention, utility infrastructure, or recovery efforts opens the door to work for grading contractors, utility crews, and general builders across fire-prone regions of the state.

The third storyline that could reshape a whole corner of the construction market is California Forever, the proposed new community that backers envision rising on ranch land in Solano County. A project of that scale, if it clears its legislative and regulatory hurdles, would represent one of the largest greenfield building programs in the state, requiring massive earthwork, new roads, water and sewer systems, and housing construction from the ground up. Legislative decisions this session could either advance or stall the framework the developers need to move forward.

For contractors, the through-line across all of these items is timing. Bills that pass in the closing days of a session often carry funding that does not turn into actual bid opportunities until agencies write program rules, issue guidelines, and release solicitations. That lag can stretch many months, meaning firms hoping to capture climate or wildfire dollars should be tracking not just whether a measure passes but how the implementing agency intends to distribute the money and on what schedule.

The scope of work that could emerge from a climate package tends to span multiple trades. Grid and clean-energy provisions bring electrical and mechanical work, from substation construction to renewable generation and battery storage installations. Water-focused spending drives demand for pipeline crews, treatment-plant builders, and heavy-civil contractors handling reservoirs, conveyance, and stormwater capture. Resilience and adaptation funding often flows to coastal armoring, levee repair, and similar earthwork-intensive projects. Each category calls on a different slice of the contracting community.

Wildfire-related work has its own construction profile. Utility hardening programs generate underground and overhead electrical work, pole replacement, and access-road construction in remote terrain. Fuel-reduction contracts favor firms with equipment for clearing and hauling vegetation across large landscapes. And when rebuilding is on the table, the demand shifts toward residential and commercial general contractors, along with the full range of subcontractors needed to reconstruct communities, from site work through finishes.

California Forever, by contrast, would be a single sustained program rather than a scattered set of grants. New-town development on that scale requires phasing that begins with mass grading and infrastructure before vertical construction can proceed. Contractors positioned for such a project would need to demonstrate capacity for large earthmoving operations, installation of dry and wet utilities, and the road and drainage systems that must be in place before homes and commercial buildings rise. The opportunity, should it materialize, would extend across many years and many bid packages.

Bid timing for anything tied to these legislative deals depends on the vehicle. Bond measures placed before voters would not produce contracts until after an election and subsequent issuance of the bonds. Direct appropriations can move faster but still require agencies to stand up programs. Private development like California Forever runs on its own schedule, driven by entitlement approvals rather than the legislative calendar, though state action can accelerate or delay those approvals.

Firms that want to be ready should treat this legislative window as an early-warning system. Monitoring which measures survive the session, and reading the fine print on how funds are structured, gives contractors a head start on aligning their qualifications, bonding capacity, and prequalification paperwork with the programs likely to fund upcoming work. Establishing relationships with the agencies that will administer new money is another way to be positioned when solicitations finally hit the street.

It is also worth remembering that legislation passed in the final days of a session frequently arrives with less detail than contractors would like, leaving key questions about eligibility, local match requirements, and project selection to be sorted out later. That uncertainty is itself useful information: it signals where firms should be asking questions and pressing for clarity as implementation begins, rather than waiting for a finished bid document to appear.

As lawmakers close out the session and turn toward the campaign trail, the construction industry has a stake in every one of these unresolved deals. Climate money, wildfire spending, and the fate of California Forever each point toward potential work for California builders and the trades that support them. The contractors who track these outcomes now, and prepare accordingly, will be the ones best placed to compete when the resulting projects finally move from statute to solicitation.

San Francisco Bridge Lands \$107.5M Rehabilitation Project

A San Francisco bridge is set for a \$107.5 million makeover, marking a significant infrastructure investment for the Bay Area and a fresh opportunity for firms working in bridge rehabilitation and heavy civil construction.

The project adds to a busy pipeline of public-works activity in Northern California. Bridge upgrades of this scale typically draw specialty subcontractors in structural steel, deck repair, seismic retrofitting, and traffic control, giving qualified California firms a shot at scopes tied to the work.

Elsewhere in the roundup, Jacobs secured a military contract, Balfour Beatty put \$13.4 million into a technology venture capital fund, and Skanska signed a \$94 million deal to build a data center in Virginia. Those items fall outside California but signal continued national appetite for large public and private builds.

For contractors tracking California opportunities, the San Francisco bridge rehabilitation is the headline item worth watching as bidding and subcontracting details emerge.
